NSW DE and Health will be implementing a meningococcal ACWY school-based vaccination program targeting Year 11 and 12 students in secondary schools from Term 2 2017 that will provide protection against meningococcal serogroups A, C and Y as well as W. This is in response to the emergence of meningococcal W as a significant cause of invasive meningococcal disease in Australia in 2016. Evidence suggests that this strain of the disease is more severe than other types.

European Art and Culture StudyTour 2018

We are in the final stages of planning for the tour. The study tour is aimed at students in year 11 and 12 studying Ancient & Modern History, Languages – French, Italian, German, Society and Culture and Visual Arts for the Higher School Certificate. The study tour is carefully designed to include the most fascinating and important art, archaeological and architectural sites of Berlin – Germany, Northern Italy, Tuscany, Florence, Venice and Paris - France.

Students will experience artworks and historical sites linking to case studies explored in the Preliminary and HSC courses both in Ancient & Modern History, Society and Culture and Visual Arts. This experience will enhance the student's ability to make critical and



historical accounts, judgments, reflections, analysis and interpretations of the world of art, architecture and archaeological sites.

This overseas excursion will be conducted from **Wednesday 11 April to Sunday 29 April 2018**. The expression of interest forms will be available early Term 2 once the tour is finalized.

Some of the museums and places of interest will include:

- **Berlin**: Reichstag, Brandenburg Gate, Jewish Museum, Sachsenhausen Nazi concentration camp, Pergamon Museum and a day trip to Potsdam.
- Northen Italy: Venice, Peggy Guggenheim Collection, Florence, Uffizi Gallery, Accademia Gallery and Day tour of Tuscany including to Siena, San Gimignano and Pisa.
- **Paris**: The Louvre, housing iconic works by Da Vinci, Delacroix, Vermeer, including Greek, Etruscan and Roman antiquities. Other museums include Musee d'Orsay, Centre Pompidou and Musee de l'Orangerie.
- **Day trips** to Giverny to visit Monet's garden and Auvers where Van Gogh spent his final days and and hopefully the dawn service at Villers Bretonneux for the 100th Anniversary on 25 April. Below are photos from 2016 tour, Florence, Musee de l'Orangerie and Venice

LMBR Financial System Change

Dear Parents and Carers

Sydney Secondary College Blackwattle Bay will transition to the new NSW public schools' finance system and a new bank account on **24 July 2017.**

To ensure a smooth transition, there will be changes to the way we accept parent or carer payments.

- Direct deposits: As of 30 June 2017, we will no longer accept direct deposits into our current school bank account as we prepare to close this account and transition to the new one. Any payments made using direct deposit after this date cannot be properly allocated to a student's account in a timely manner. Please ensure you have made any outstanding direct deposits before 30 June 2017.
- EFTPOS payments: We will not be able to accept EFTPOS payments between 19 July and 24 July 2017. Please ensure that you have made any outstanding EFTPOS payments before 19 July 2017. From 25 July 2017, EFTPOS payments will be accepted as before.
- Cash and cheque payments: Between 19 July 2017 and 24 July 2017, we will also not be able to accept payments by cash or cheque as we prepare to close our current bank account and transition to the new one. Please ensure that you have made any outstanding cash or cheque payments before 19 July 2017. From 25 July 2017, cash and cheque payments will be accepted as before.

Earth and Environmental Excursion to Australian Museum

Despite the pouring rain on Friday 17th March, my year 12 Earth and Environmental Science students had a fantastic day at the Australian Museum.

They attended a workshop identifying fossil remains, mimicking a palaeontologist scientist working in the field. Plus they got to handle real specimens of 3.5 billion year old rock that provided evidence for the oceans changing from anoxic (no oxygen) to oxic (oxygenated oceans) from billions



years ago.

We also got to see life-sized models of the kind of organisms, which used to

inhabit Australia 50,000 years ago, the Australian Megafauna (see pictures). Climate change and hunting were responsible for their demise.

STUDY SKILLS NEWSLETTER FOR APRIL

Are you a 'carrot' or a 'stick' person?

Knowing whether you are motivated by avoiding pain and the pressure of consequences or by achieving pleasure and rewards can help you (and your parents) work out the best way for you to be motivated to do your work for school.

The concept comes from the idea that to make a donkey move forward you can either tempt it with a carrot (a reward) or threaten it with a stick (a punishment). Now we are not saying that you are a donkey! But we are saying that different things motivate different people.

You are likely to be more of a 'carrot' person if you:

- Tend to be focused on achieving goals
- Make lots of plans and lists for yourself
- Find the concepts of rewards and prizes very motivating
- Often have a clear picture of what you want to achieve

You are likely to be more of a 'stick' person if you:

- Tend to leave things to the last minute
- Put off unpleasant tasks
- Prefer to do things when you 'feel' like it rather than when you plan it
- Like the idea of rewards but aren't keen on doing the work to achieve them

If you are a 'carrot' person, you can get yourself motivated to do the work by breaking down the task, setting targets and goals and making plans. The thought of getting a good mark or achieving a prize is very motivating for you. Your parents can motivate you further by offering rewards for achievements!

If you are a 'stick' person, you find it harder to get yourself motivated to do the work. You are more likely to work when you focus on the consequences of NOT working.

When you are putting things off, spend a minute or so brainstorming all of the outcomes if you do not get started on the work. Then decide the first 3 most important things for you to do. Don't worry about the rest at this stage, just focus on the top 3.

For parents of 'stick' children, these students may often require more micromanagement. Students may need help in determining what they are going to work on, and parents may need to then check in every half hour or so to ensure students are staying on task. These students will be more motivated by negative consequences such as removal of technology or other privileges if outlined working conditions are not met. However it is a good idea to always balance the introduction of consequences for not doing the work with rewards for doing it! This may not be the driving force for their motivation, but positive reinforcement for doing the right thing can lead to really good outcomes.

For students who get frustrated with themselves being 'stick' people and leaving things until the last minute, you can start to move towards becoming more of a 'carrot' person. Identify some of your 'carrot' friends, and start to model their behaviour. Ask if you can plan the work together and check in regularly with each so you stay on track. It is possible to switch from one modality to another! However no one can make you do it, you need to want to change and then you need to work towards switching your mindset.
